

Thank you for considering Northern Michigan University! You may also apply online at www.nmu.edu/application. This application can be used for the following student categories:

- **Degree-Seeking New Freshman** – A student who will be attending college for the first time after high school completion. This includes students who have taken college courses *while still in high school*. (Students who have completed some college level credit after high school graduation, but fewer than 12 semester credit hours, are reviewed both as new freshmen and new transfer students.)
- **Degree-Seeking New Transfer Student** – A student who has completed college-level work at a college or university after high school graduation and has not completed a baccalaureate degree.
- **Post-Baccalaureate Student** – A student who has obtained a baccalaureate degree who is planning to complete a second undergraduate degree (in a field other than previous degree) or seek an initial secondary or elementary provisional teaching certificate. Post baccalaureate students may not attend as non-degree or undeclared students.
- **Non-Degree Student** – A student who has completed high school (but not a baccalaureate degree) who plans to take courses for personal or professional development, and who is not planning to pursue a diploma,

certificate, or degree at this time. Those with a baccalaureate degree who do not wish to pursue another degree must take courses as a “non-degree graduate student” and should complete a graduate application.

- **Dual Enrollment (Non-Degree High School) Student** – A student who will be enrolled at NMU and in high school at the same time.

Note: **Returning (re-entry) students***, **guest students**, **graduate students** and **international students** should not complete this application, but rather should contact the Admissions Office to obtain the correct form (also found online at www.nmu.edu/application.) Canadian students may complete this application and submit a *Declaration and Certification of Finances* form (available from the Admissions Office or online) or may complete the *International Student Application for Admission*.

*Returning (re-entry) students (students who have previously taken courses at NMU, not completed a baccalaureate degree, and who have not attended for over one year) may complete the brief update form at www.nmu.edu/reentry or may complete this form.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING THE UNDERGRADUATE APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION

1. **Application Form** – Complete the *Undergraduate Application for Admission* form. If you have previously applied, please notify the Admissions Office. We keep previous applications on file for one year from the semester of intended enrollment.
Students who are applying to be dually enrolled at NMU while still attending high school should also complete the *Dual Enrollment-Permission to Enroll Form* available from the NMU Admissions Office or www.nmu.edu/dualenrollment.
2. **Application Fee** – Submit the \$30 non-refundable application processing fee in one of these ways:
 - By credit card at www.nmu.edu/appfee;
 - By credit card via phone at 906-227-2650 or 800-682-9797;
 - By check or money order made payable to NMU; please include the applicant’s name on the check.
 - By cash at the Admissions Office, 2212 Hedgcock Building.
 These applicants are not required to pay the application fee:
 - Those qualifying for the senior citizen tuition waiver (age 62 or older);
 - Those who have previously attended NMU at the same level to which they are applying (an application fee is required only once at undergraduate application and once at post-baccalaureate/graduation application).
 Applicants who wish to update to a future term may apply their paid fee to any term occurring within one calendar year of the initial term of application.
Application fee waivers may be available to those whose financial circumstances warrant it. To request a fee waiver, please provide a brief letter stating your request and why. The letter may be from the applicant, parent, guidance counselor, or agency aware of the financial situation.
3. **Transcripts** – Request official high school transcript, or GED score report, and any college/university/trade school/military transcripts be sent to the Admissions Office. You must have an official

transcript submitted directly from each institution you attended even if no credits were earned. (Transcripts from foreign institutions must be sent to an external agency for evaluation. Please contact the Admissions Office for information.)

Non-degree applicants, transfer applicants who have earned more than 12 college-level credits after high school, and post-baccalaureate applicants do not need to submit high school transcripts. Re-entry students need to supply transcripts from institutions attended since last attendance at NMU.

If you are currently in high school, submit the application and application fee to the counselor of the high school you are currently attending. The counselor will complete the final section of the application and forward it to the NMU Admissions Office with an official high school transcript. If you have been enrolled at a college while you were in high school, you must list that college and number of credits on the application form. Please request that an official college transcript be sent directly to the NMU Admissions Office upon course completion so credit may be granted.

If you are not currently attending high school, please send the application and fee directly to the NMU Admissions Office.

4. **Test Scores** – Request ACT or SAT scores to be sent to NMU. These may be on the official high school transcript or sent directly from the testing agency. (Exempt: students who plan to transfer 12 or more semester hours of college-level credit taken after high school; non-Canadian international students; persons who completed high school at least three years prior to semester of intended enrollment; and applicants to many diploma, certificate, and associate degree programs – see *Academic Programs* list). Students applying for an education major should submit test scores regardless of exemption. **NMU’s ACT code: 2038; SAT Code 1560.**

ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS

NMU provides a wide range of educational opportunities and has varying admissions requirements. Details about admissions policies for various academic programs and student applicant types can be found at www.nmu.edu/application or www.nmu.edu/bulletin. Each applicant's materials are reviewed individually. Applicants who do not meet all criteria will be fully considered by the Admission Review Committee. The university retains the right to exercise judgment as to the eligibility of applicants for specific courses of study and to withdraw an offer of admission if a student's academic record significantly changes between the date of admission and enrollment.

Secondary School Academic Preparation – Michigan students should follow the Michigan Merit Curriculum, and it is preferred that all students take core courses as follows: four years of English, four years of college preparatory mathematics; four years of social studies; four years of science; two years of foreign language. These are the courses used to recalculate the GPA for admissions and scholarship purposes. Beyond these core courses, students are encouraged to take courses or get experience in the arts and information technology.

Computation of High School Grade Point Averages – The grade point average of high school students is recomputed on a 4.00 scale (A+, A, A- = 4; B+, B, B- = 3; etc.) by counting all grades received in core subjects as outlined above, for a minimum of six semesters. Grades in courses designated on the transcript as “honors,” International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced Placement (AP) – as well as college courses listed on the high school transcript – receive added weight in the computation.

Standardized Achievement Testing – NMU will accept either the ACT or SAT results and will always consider the highest ACT composite or SAT combined score from a single test date for admission and scholarship purposes if a student submits multiple test results. Writing scores are not required or considered.

Home-Schooled Applicants – Students who have been home schooled at any time during grades 9-12, and who have not earned 12 or more college-level credits after completion of high school, should submit their ACT/SAT results and an official transcript of courses taken and grades earned while home schooled. A final transcript verifying high school graduation/ completion, or an official GED score report, is also required. The official transcript may be from a school district, home school/curriculum agency, or the parent (if the parent was the educator). If a transcript is parent-produced, it should contain the graduation date, a statement that the information is accurate, and should be signed by the parent and notarized.

HOUSING REQUIREMENT

Because residence hall living is linked to positive gains for students, as a *Condition of Enrollment*, NMU requires most students taking nine credit hours or more and not living at home with their parents (within 60 miles of campus) to live on campus in a residence hall for four semesters (unless they are 21 or older or have reached junior status prior to class registration or are veterans with at least one year of active service). COSTS: 2009-2010

NMU operates under a “flat-rate” tuition plan, which means students can enroll in any number of credits between 12 and 18 per semester for one rate. For students living on campus, room and board costs include a double-occupancy room, a meal plan, unlimited use of residence hall laundry facilities, free local phone service, activity programming, cable, and computer network access from your residence hall room.

Tuition and fees include the use of a notebook computer for all full-time students (12 credits or more per semester). An additional \$150 per semester for a MacBook applies to Art and Design majors. Each new student pays a one-time student athletic event fee of \$225 which covers the entire period of enrollment. The university offers payment plans. Families should also consider these additional expenses which may vary by student:

- Textbooks and supplies
- Transportation and personal expenses
- Recreational Facilities Pass (optional: \$65/semester; \$120/year)
- Parking Pass (optional: \$130/year).
